Cheltenham goes under cover to reduce threat from frost

BEING the theatre of champions brings an unforgiving scrutiny. Cheltenham launched its new season yesterday and, after a year in which more than one drama escalated swiftly into crisis, the themes were prevention, protection and, though unspoken, perception.

The four-day Festival in March endured the sobering statistic of 11 equine fatalities, indefensible figures that have duly been addressed. If some of the measures can and will be dismissed as cosmetic by those involved in the sport, they must also acknowledge that doing nothing would have invited censure.

So there will be reduced max-

imum fields of 28 in all handicap hurdles at the next Festival, which boasts prize-money of more than £3 million, and the controversial National Hunt Chase will now be limited to 20, rather than 24. A fence has been moved, hurdles redesigned and veterinary reviews introduced.

But Cheltenham's winter of discontent also included a key meeting lost to frost and intensifying problems with low sun turning late afternoon steeplechases into a dangerous farce. There can be no guarantees against the climate but the search for solutions has been long and expensive.

Racecourse Holdings Trust (RHT), the Jockey Club company that owns Cheltenham and nine other jumps courses,

announced yesterday that it has secured 45 acres of frost covers for the coming winter and will deploy them at grade one weekend meetings.

Upwards of £100,000 has been spent on a 12-month lease and additional costs will be induced each time they are used. So far, no sponsor is involved, as RHT has decided on its own initiative, rather than await the ongoing discussions involving the Racecourse Association and Betfair.

John Maxse, RHT's spokesman, explained: "We badly wanted to do something for this season, rather than have a further wait." He added that the covers would sometimes be sufficient to cover two entire courses, though this does not apply at Cheltenham.

Simon Claisse, clerk of the course at Cheltenham, said: "We need all 45 acres of covers for most of our meetings but 75 acres would be required for the Festival. We're still taking a view as to how best to approach that meeting but we're looking forward to this capability of protecting against frosts of down to -6 degrees."

The covers were rolled out for media inspection yesterday. Not on show, however, was the screen recommended to counteract low sun shining down the home straight at the midwinter meetings. "The scientists tell us it would need to be 65m tall and 120m wide and simply holding down something of that size would take up our entire south car park," Claisse reported.

With this scheme a self-evident non-starter, Cheltenham is continuing to search for physical solutions while taking the reluctant step of reshuffling its running order at all meetings from November to January.

"The problem only applies to chases run late in the day, so we simply won't schedule any," Claisse said. "We will lose the conventional rhythm and could end with three successive hurdle races but that is better than having chases with a lot of the fences not being jumped."

One horse already being directed at a Festival novice chase had his first public outing over fences at Exeter yesterday. Natal, the first of Paul Nicholls's formidable team of novices to appear, was unextended to win at 1-3.

Some uninspired hurdling form has given way to better efforts over fences, and a repeat of a 4l second to Jefertiti in a handicap chase at Uttoxeter (2m, soft) a week ago - off today's mark - may well be good enough. The tricky one is Willie The Fish, who showed bits of form two seasons ago but has not run for 18 months. A long absence is also a prob-lem with Super Dolphin, not seen since unseating his rider in a handicap chase at Leicester (2m, good) last December. Real Definition made a series of jumping errors when 211 sixth to Sitting Duck in a handicap chase at Taunton (2m 3f, good to soft) on his most recent start, while Kirby's Vic tried to run out before unseat-

Preference, though, is for the other bottom weight, CARIBOU, who looked a chaser in the making when winning two of his three novice hurdles last season and is thrust straight into handicap company over fences, seemingly on an attractive mark. Fait Le Jojo ran well in valuable handicap hurdles last season but failed to complete on his two most recent starts over fences in 2003. Having won over 3m 1f at Fakenham last season, Briery
